

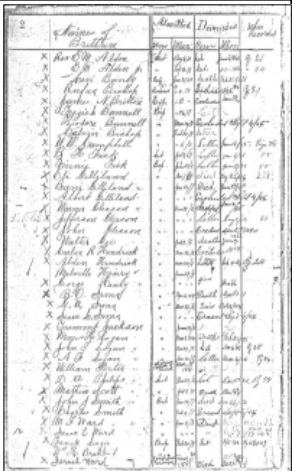

From the Paul Henry Scrapbook at the Linesville Historical Society, page 13, column 3:
 "IRONS - At his late residence, Linesville, Sept. 3d, Deacon Bradford O. Irons, aged 57 years.
 Deacon Irons was born in Linesville in 1834. At the age of 18 he united with the First Baptist Church of the same place. He was baptized into Christ by the late Rev. Mr. Alden. He was always a very zealous worker in the church, and during his life he was actively engaged in various Christian labors. He became associated with the choir, and for fifteen years he was the Sabbath school superintendent. He was also chosen a Deacon, which office he maintained with great honor until his death. Deacon Irons was a very charitable man, and was always ready to assist in promoting the interests of Christ. Besides being an honored and trustworthy member of the church, he was always connected with Linesville Lodge No. 395, IOOF, who turned out in a body at his funeral.
 In 1872 president Grant appointed Mr. Irons postmaster of Linesville, which position he held through the various administrations until the election of Cleveland. For several years he served on the school board of this place.
 His many friends lose in him a true friend and brother, one who ever held sacredly to the Divine teachings of his blessed Master. On July 7th Deacon Irons started on a Western trip, and returned after an absence of seven weeks, on August 25th. He contracted a very severe cold while away, which finally developed into a very dangerous malarial fever, which disease resulted in his death, as above stated."
