- His obituary was published in the Linesville Herald May 11, 1910 in Linesville Borough, Crawford County, PA. Page 1, column 5:

DEATH'S ROLL CALL

Dr. George Taylor Rankin died May 7, 1910 in the 72d year of his ge. He was at his store, Friday, taken ill and went home; death came before morning. He was born in Washington county, this State, in 1838, and graduated from Jefferson college in 1859. After a residence in Mississippi he went to Philadelphia and graduated from a medical college. Soon after he came to Linesville (1866) and enjoyed a large practice until he gave up the practice of medicine and carried on the drug business, now Rankin & Son. For many years he was one of the leading physicians. The funeral was held at the house, Monday, conducted by Rev. G.B. Carr. In 1860 G.T. Rankin and Miss Melvina Andrews were married. His wife survives and five of six children - John, Mrs. Mitchell, Mrs. Brown, M.C. and Edgar. Deceased was a charter member of Linesville Masonic lodge, Royal Arcanum, Protective Home Circle.

Marriage Notes (Malvina J. Andrews)

From the Linesville Herald, June 2, 1886, page 3, column 1:

A spirited horse belonging to Dr. GT Rankin ran away with his two small sons, Ed. and Mall, and George Miller, Friday. The horse was being driven before a light wagon into town from the East Side, when one of the traces became unhooked, striking the animal on the leg. The now frightened horse began plunging and detached itself from the vehicle. As the horse ran through town it left the center of the road and ran so close to Mr. SS Dorchester's carriage, standing on one side of the street, that the harness on the running horse clanged against the buggy. If the harness had caught, the momentum of the horse would, undoubtedly, have overturned the rig and the occupants, Mrs. Dorchester and Mrs. Sam Miller, been thrown out and the result only can be conjectured. The horse was soon caught, but was uninjured save a few bruises.
