- Her obituary was published. From the Garwood Scrapbook at the Linesville Historical Society:
 Mrs. Malvina Andrews Rankin died at Winter Haven, Fla., March 28, 1918. Malvina Andrews was born at Adamsville, Pa., in the year 1839. She was graduated at Westminster College, class of '57 and was married to Dr. GT Rankin in 1860. They came to Linesville over fifty years ago; she spent more than half her life a resident of Linesville and for several years was a teacher in the public schools of this place. More than 40 years she was member of ME church and teacher of a Bible class thirty years. Her membership in the Ladies Literature Club of Linesville dates from the formation of the literatuare study organization.
 The funeral took place Monday afternoon at two o'clock, at the ME church, with her pastor, Rev. JG Ginader in charge of the services; interment in the Linesville cemetery.
 Five children survive - Mrs. J Will Mitchell and Mrs. Vet L Brown, and John Rankin of Winter Haven, Fla., Mal C Rankin of Linesville, and EA Rankin of Conneaut Lake. One sister, Mrs HP McMichael of McKeesport. Mrs. Rankin had one of those rary sunny dispositions that coule always see a silver lining to the blackest storm cloud. Her life was all that the word "mother" implies to a large family of children.

Marriage Notes (Dr. George Taylor Rankin)

From the Linesville Herald, June 2, 1886, page 3, column 1:
A spirited horse belonging to Dr. GT Rankin ran away with his two small sons, Ed. and Mall, and George Miller, Friday. The horse was being driven before a light wagon into town from the East Side, when one of the traces became unhooked, striking the animal on the leg. The now frightened horse began plunging and detached itself from the vehicle. As the horse ran through town it left the center of the road and ran so close to Mr. SS Dorchester's carriage, standing on one side of the street, that the harness on the running horse clanged against the buggy. If the harness had caught, the momentum of the horse would, undoubtedly, have overturned the rig and the occupants, Mrs. Dorchester and Mrs. Sam Miller, been thrown out and the result only can be conjectured. The horse was soon caught, but was uninjured save a few bruises.

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
